



COMMUNITY NEEDS ASSESSMENT & ACTION PLAN OUTCOMES

In 2021 CVCAA conducted a full Community Needs Assessment across the main eleven counties that we serve. Using a combination of surveys, interviews and focus groups, we found out what our neighbors really need.

To ensure that our agency is focused on resolutions for our community's most pressing needs, every year we create an action plan that is reported to the state for approval. We want to make sure that our work focuses on alleviating the needs of our neighbors.

Our next community needs assessment will be conducted in 2024.






PROGRAM REPORTS

Programs at CVCAA are focused on moving families toward stable housing and keeping them there. Maybe that is helping with an electric bill, but it could also be paying a rental deposit, repairing a broken furnace, providing internet access, or even moving a family into their first home. In 2022, CVCAA placed over \$8.2 million dollars back into our community.



I wanted to tell you from my heart how much of a Godsend your organization has been for me.

THE IMPACT

Many of the people who come to our agency for assistance are employed, but still live paycheck to paycheck. They work hard, but struggle to make ends meet. These are clients just like Jenny*.

Jenny came to our agency to apply for utility assistance. As a single mom, she was getting by and working full time, but there never seemed to be enough money to go around. Luckily, her mom was able to help her so she wasn't alone. Unfortunately, Jenny's mom passed away. She not only lost her biggest supporter, but now had the added medical and funeral expenses.

We were able to help Jenny with utility assistance and a food card to alleviate some of her biggest needs. We also ensured that she applied with SNAP so she could get provide for her children. With a little extra breathing room in her budget Jenny is able to be a strong mother to her children while they learn to live without their grandmother.

COMMUNITY SERVICES BLOCK GRANT

The Community Services Block Grant (CSBG) is a small piece of funding for CVCAA. However, this is the crucial piece that connects us with 1000 other Community Action Agencies across the county.

The primary program funded by CSBG is the Transition Out of Poverty (TOPS) Case Management program. TOPS connects individuals who are working for a better future with essential services, special funding, and a guiding hand to walk with them through their education, past graduation, and into a new career. Our staff work to create a plan with our neighbors so that they can break the cycle of generational poverty.

THE IMPACT

Amy* joined our TOPS Case Management program in April of 2022. At the time she had just begun the RMA program at Howard College. As a single mom, she knew that she needed a steady career to provide for her girls and set an example for them. Every day, Amy made the commute from Ozona so that she could attend classes.

Despite a long commute and the stress of school, Amy not only graduated, but did so with honors. She was inducted into Phi Theta Kappa, an honor society for two-year colleges. Amy didn't get to walk for her high school graduation and is the first person in her family to go to college, so she was proud to walk across the stage in December to accept her diploma.

Our case manager walked next to Amy on her path providing a caring listener, practical advice, and helping with expenses such as tuition and scrubs.

Amy is now working as an RMA with Shannon Medical Center. This year, she plans to buy a house in San Angelo and is looking forward to her new, brighter future with her family.

WEATHERIZATION PROGRAM

William Ferreira

Weatherization is a free program available to both homeowners and neighbors who rent their homes. This program provides services such as insulation, weather stripping, and caulking. These services help to lower utility costs by making a home more energy efficient. On average, families receiving weatherization services see a savings of \$283 per year.

In addition to basic weatherization services, we also provide HVAC repairs and replacement and minor home repairs when funds are available. These important repairs save our neighbors money and reduce their burden on the energy grid that we all share.

THE IMPACT

Two weeks before Christmas, Mrs. Jones's* home was assessed for weatherization. During the inspection, she mentioned that her home was always cold in the winter months and super hot during the summer months. Sometimes it was cooler outside in the shade than it was in the house.

Our team discovered that there was not any insulation in the attic or the exterior walls. Her home was also leaking air around the air conditioning units, some holes in the walls, and unsealed windows and doors. This meant her utility bills were much higher than they should be.

By using several different funding sources, CVCAA was able to insulate Mrs. Jones's home and replace her doors and windows. Once all the work was completed, our team conducted a final inspection on a day when it was only 22 degrees outside, but Mrs. Joes was warm in her home in only shorts and a tank top.

Now Mrs. Jones can be comfortable in her home year round and she is saving money on her energy bills.

HOUSING PROGRAMS

CVCAA currently operates multiple housing programs to assist our neighbors in obtaining safe and secure housing. We work with neighbors who need assistance moving into a new apartment, those who are facing eviction, and homeless neighbors who are trying to get off the street.

In 2022, our agency was able to utilize a combination of different grant and state funds to bring housing stabilization to our community despite soaring housing costs in our area. CVCAA follows a Housing First model that recognizes the importance of safe housing in order for our neighbors to reach their full potential.

THE IMPACT

When a domestic violence situation caused Clara* to become homeless, she wasn't sure where to go with her large family. As the only working adult, she had a lot on her plate taking care of her children and her disabled sister. She knew she could afford an apartment, but coming up with all the deposits and upfront fees was keeping her from finding a home.

CVCAA was able to help her move into a new home and helped with rent for a few months to let her build up some savings. Clara was completely selfsufficient and taking care of her family when tragedy struck and they lost their home in a fire.

CVCAA was happy to step in again. The family was safely and temporarily housed in a hotel while CVCAA housing staff helped them find their new home. Clara was also connected Clara to other agencies who could help with immediate needs like clothes and shoes.

Now Clara and her family are safe, secure, and completely self-sufficient in their beautiful new home. Sometimes it really does take a village!

OUTREACH & MARKETING

It's one thing to provide services to our community, but it's not enough. At CVCAA, we want to meet our neighbors where they are. This includes making regular visits to all the

counties in our service area. Our outreach specialist is on hand, so our rural neighbors can apply for assistance and learn about our programs.

This year we also held our first annual Burrito Standoff. This event pitted burritos from all over the city in an intense battle for the title of "Best Burrito". The Burrito Standoff helped bring awareness to our agency and to some phenomenal restaurants who are dedicated to helping us in our fight against poverty.

We also focused on ensuring that our neighbors get the services they need, even if it's not something that we can assist with. In 2022, we sent over 100 referrals to our partner agencies to ensure that our neighbors are fully supported on their path to self-sufficiency. Our team also launched a hygiene closet in 2022 to provide full sized hygiene products to anyone who needs them.

THE IMPACT

Things were looking up for Dan.* He just got a new, better job that was going to provide more financial security for his family and he was looking forward to their future. But before that future could start, he had to make it until his first paycheck arrived which wouldn't be for another month.

They had enough money to cover the bills, but were running low on items like toothpaste and deodorant. With weeks until more money came in, Dan's family was starting to ration their products, which can lead to hygiene issues for everyone.

Thankfully, Dan heard about our hygiene closet and stopped into the office. We were able to provide his family with full sized items that would keep them clean and healthy until that first check came in.

HOMELESS OUTREACH

At CVCAA we are here to help all of our low-income neighbors, and that includes our homeless neighbors. Since the closure of our only homeless shelter, CVCAA, in collaboration with other area agencies, has been working to keep our unhoused neighbors safe while we find more permanent solutions. This year we participated in the Into the Warmth program run by the Concho Valley Homeless Planning Coalition (CVHPC) to get our neighbors into hotel rooms during freezing temperatures.

Our homeless outreach team spends at least one day a week visiting with our homeless neighbors at various campsites and at the Oasis day shelter. They work to connect them to services and provide essentials such as food and clothing. This team also participates in the Homeless Navigation Day program (also under the CVHPC). This multi-agency effort brings together over a dozen service providers to a single location so our unhoused neighbors can get the right kind of help that will move them closer to a housing solution.

THE IMPACT

Shannon* had a normal life. A home with her husband in the suburbs and everything she thought she wanted. Until he began abusing her. Shannon fled domestic abuse and came to San Angelo. But without her family, a job, or even her possessions, she had to start over from scratch.

Shannon is staying at the family shelter and is trying to go back to school at Howard so she can become a nurse. She wants a life where she can take care of herself and others.

But with nothing to her name, getting started was the biggest battle until Shannon found our Homeless Navigation Day. There she was able to get help with her IDs and learn about other opportunities like the Workforce Education program.

With the right support system, Amy has a bright future ahead of her.


FINANCIAL FOCUS


